Left Spread: The Spruce Elementary stairwell is home to an expansive experiential graphic reaching toward the glow of the skylight above. Students, family members, and staff see themselves throughout, reaching into a field of words about trees – leaf, roots, branch – written in student handwriting in the 20 languages spoken at the school.

Right Spread: The BTA workplace welcomes visitors with a personalized back-lit sign. Wall covering with custom 3D raised graphics wraps the mezzanine complimenting the wood paneling.







Left Spread: A bench residing within a recessed alcove at Vancouver School of Arts and Academics surrounds students with warm wood, calm lighting, and inspirational words— offering respite and uplifting energy throughout a busy school day.

Right Spread: Abstract wall graphics inspired by blood vessels and cells accent the TAF@Saghalie Health Clinic corridor, complimenting the interior color palette and offering engaging design for visitors to the clinic.








Left Spread: At Raisbeck Aviation High School, experiential graphics immerse students in the specialized aeronautical focus of the school.

Right Spread: Using an analogy of textiles on a weaving loom, contemporary graphics feature a series of color variations across the bands of color. These colors mimic a piece of thread weaving in and out of the loom. At the entryway, the "threads" consist of a timeline of notable Highline High School history.







Left Spread: A stippled panther mascot graphic accentuates the Stewart Middle School project lab, reinforcing the identity of the school.

Right Spread: Lakota Middle School graphics celebrate the Lushootseed language, one of the languages of the indigenous Coast Salish peoples.















Left Spread: At Walnut Grove Elementary, each learning community has its own unique identity based around school-selected character traits of safe, responsible, kind, and respectful.

Right Spread: Educational graphics overlayed on windows of the Highline High School boiler room showcase the systems for all students to see.









Left Spread: Trees which could not be saved during construction are reused in a wall feature which educates and informs. Students chose a timeline of events to offer context to the age of the trees. Low hanging elements encourage touch and hands-on engagement.

Right Spread: A tie to the history of the old auditorium, the original chairs were reconfigured as dimensional flush-mount lighting fixtures around the perimeter of the new space.







Left spread: This interior 'truth window' at St. Thomas School displays systems hidden within the building's walls, and the exterior downspout subtly informs students how rainwater flows through a runnel to water the adjacent landscaping.

Right Spread: The Truman Elementary School trailblazer mascot-inspired wall graphics remind students that the path of discovery includes socializing, learning, and exploring new horizons. The graphics are dispersed throughout the school to evoke the trailblazer spirit.
